

POLITICAL ACTION COMMITTEE REPORT

The local PAC met in the fall of this year to discuss the outcome of the provincial election and involvement in the municipal election. The PAC remains very small, and would like to rebuild next year and see representation from all schools. As we are well aware the current Conservative government is underfunding our public education system by a significant amount. This was expected when they were re-elected, and will likely continue for as long as they hold a majority in the provincial legislature. Electing a more education friendly government is necessary to begin rebuilding the damage that has already been done to our public schools, and planning for this should begin at the local level now. We ask all members to consider the impact we can all have collectively if we engage in a unified election strategy.

During the fall municipal elections we supported candidates who were endorsed by the local labour council. We were pleased to see those whom we supported elected, and we do have open dialogue now with those supported candidates who were elected to municipal councils and our school board of trustees.

The Educational Services committee has enjoyed the convenience of virtual meetings this year, holding all meetings over Zoom. A review of the new *Joint Staff Development* (JSD) fund application process found that the online process is working well. After much consideration, the committee decided to run a pilot project this year which invites OSSTF members to request funds for "PD materials" that support their teaching. The committee has ear-marked a limited amount of funds for this purpose for each school, and is looking forward to seeing what our members submit! The *Technology Enhancement Program* (TEP) was subject to multi-year data review this year, which led the committee to recommend an increase in the per member TEP allocation from a maximum of \$500 to \$750, starting next year.

Spring Staffing Update

Staffing this year has been complicated by the late release of the Grants for Student needs. The Joint Staffing Committee agreed to delay timelines to allow the Board to determine its funding for staffing.

While we were successful in preventing any teachers being declared surplus to the system this year (lay-offs), there were a number of teachers surplus to their schools. These teachers were the focus of staffing at the June 5th meeting of the JSC, along with voluntary mobility.

Most, but not all of the teachers who were surplus to schools have now been placed for next year. Those remaining will be dealt with on June 14th as the board is hiring a system position that will generate more staffing that we hope will improve the placement offerings for the remaining surplus teachers.

Voluntary mobility was a real challenge this year, with a large number of applicants and very few openings. We were able to make 3 mobility offers, but that is all to date. Those teachers who applied remain on the mobility list for the year, and will be looked at again prior to semester 2 staffing.

TORONTO, ON - The Ontario Secondary School Teachers' Federation (OSSTF/FEESO) is calling attention to the significant cuts to public education funding following the release of the Grants for Students Needs (GSN) on Monday, April 17.

"On Monday, the Ford government tried to hide their release of the Grants for Student Needs, which reveal the government's funding for school boards for the coming school year," said OSSTF/FEESO President Karen Littlewood. "The reason the government tried to sneak them past everyone is that they include major cuts to funding for school boards. When adjusted for inflation, over \$600 per student has been cut compared to last year's funding levels."

As detailed in a recent Canadian Centre for Policy Alternatives article, the 2023-2024 GSNs show per pupil projected funding stands at \$13,133, down over \$600 compared to the \$13,747 per pupil funding for the last school year when adjusted for inflation. In fact, over \$1200 per student has been cut since the Ford government took office in 2018.
